

Workshop to Scale Up the Implementation of Collaborative TB/HIV Activities in Africa

Aim:

To review progress in implementation and promote strategies that increase access to early ART for people living with HIV and active TB, and that accelerate the scale up of the 3Is for HIV/TB in the African Region

Objectives:

1. To discuss recent developments in HIV/TB globally and in the African Region
2. To review progress and share country experiences for the scale-up of the Three I's for HIV/TB and early ART for TB/HIV co-infected patients
3. To review the national systems for monitoring and evaluation of TB/HIV activities, including the 3-interlinked patient monitoring system
